ANNOUNCE to the public that the above named College has been incorporated, and organized, and will open for students on Wednesday, September 13, 1882.

ACCOMMODATIONS.

A fine college building will be erected during the year. Until that is ready suitable rooms have been secured in the

city and all needful conveniences and accommodations have been provided.

DEPARTMENTS.

The College will be organized with College, Preparatory and Normal Departments.

The College will have a Classical and Scientific course of study, which will be specifically defined hereafter. The requirements for admission to the college course will be the same as those established for similar institutions.

THE PREPARATORY DEPARTMENT.

As its name implies, is intended to prepare students for the Freshmen class of the College.

Students who have completed the usual common school course of study will be admitted to this Department.

NORMAL DEPARTMENT.

The object of the Normal course is to prepare teachers for the Public Schools of the State.

The course of study will embrace all the branches usually taught in the Public Schools, and such professional training as seems best adapted to fit teachers for their work. Methods of teaching and school management will receive special attention.

Professor Wilson, who takes charge of this department, has been for many years connected with the State Normal School of Indiana. His training and experience recommend him as specially qualified for this work.

ADMISSION AND CLASSIFICATION.

Pupils will be received and classified in each department according to the qualifications shown by examination.

No distinction will be made as to conditions of admission or requirement in the course of study on account of sex.

BOARDING AND ROOMS.

Boarding in families can be obtained at reasonable rates.

Rooms furnished or unfurnished can be had at low rates by those who desire to board themselves.

BOOKS AND STATIONERY.

These will be furnished at less than usual retail prices.

A LIBRARY AND READING ROOM

Will be provided for the use of the students.

Provision has been made for special instruction in vocal and instrumental music, drawing, painting, penmanship and book-keeping.

The terms and vacations for the year are arranged as follows:

Fall term of fourteen weeks. Commences Sept. 18, and ends Dec. 20, 1882.

Winter term of eleven weeks. Commences Jan. 8, and ends March 21, 1883.

Spring term of eleven weeks. Commences April 4, and ends June 21, 1883.

Rates of tuition: Preparatory and Normal.

For the Fall term, \$7.00.

Winter and Spring term, each, \$5.00.

Music and Drawing, extra.

This College was instituted by and will be mainly under the supervision of the Presbyterian denomination. It is intended to be a christian institution in its work and influence, evangelical in its spirit and tone. While teaching the principles and duties of the Christian religion, no favor or distinction will be shown on account of any form of religious belief.

The purpose and endeavor of the College will be to stimulate and discipline the intellectual and moral faculties; to cultivate such habits and inculcate such sentiments as tend to develop in the students the characteristics of strong, earnest and conscientious men and women.
